Unofficial sample ballot and FYI-2019 election cycle information

Mississippi voters are NOT registered by party. You vote anyway you want to.

In all Primary elections, your name is printed in the Democrat poll book and the Republican poll book. The voter goes to the table of their choice.

If you vote in one party in the first primary, August 6, you have to vote in that same party, if you want to vote & there is a runoff August 27th. There is no crossover voting.

If you do not vote August 6, you may still vote in the runoff August 27th.

You do not need your voter registration card to vote, BUT it often helps the poll workers and lets you know where your correct precinct location is for 2019, listed first as County precinct.

Mississippi has had Voter I-D for all elections since June 2014. You will need to have a government issued picture I-D as with your driver's license. Out of State licenses are acceptable and also an expired license up until 10 years. (ex. parent no longer drives)

A split precinct is where you and I can be voting in the SAME precinct location and yet have different names on the ballot. Refer to the bottom of your voter registration card for your Senate, Representative, Justice Court Judge and Constable districts for 2019 elections.

For your vote to count, you need to be voting in your correct precinct. Every time you move your clerk's office needs to be notified, even if you change apartments within the same complex. If you drop the use of a P O BOX or add a P O BOX, this could affect the mail situation, and your clerk's office needs to also know that. It is not legal to go back to your old precinct location to vote.

Your ballot will count even if you skip a race, but we hope there has been enough educational information available from the candidates for you to vote your entire ballot.

Unopposed candidates would still appreciate your vote.

Write-in's DO NOT COUNT. By law, the write-in space is required in case, as an example, a candidate passes away, etc.
